

During the mid-1930s in an effort to get more than its market share of sales during the Great Depression, Cities Service decorated the outside of many of its filling stations. The over the top promotion entailed covering its buildings to look like a block of ice to promote its "Koolmotor" high test anti-knock gasoline, and motor oil. To make sure motorists did not miss seeing the stations, a checkerboard patterned tower that looks like one used on a lighthouse was added on top.

It appears this filling station, operated in Knoxville, Tennessee, by Edward Jones concentrated on sales of fuel, oil, greasing and washing and not mechanical repairs. A pair of 1936 Fords are in the station yard and a 1934 Ford sedan (visible in detail below) fitted with an accessory metal trunk. The add-on appears like it may have been produced by the Potter Company that manufactured and sold Ford aftermarket products.

Trailering to Shows

There are many advantages to trailering your precious beauty to a show. You don't need to worry about a breakdown from an exploding hose, broken belt or

brake issue. Your pride and joy arrives clean with no paint chips or windshield stars.

However, trailering is not to be undertaken lightly. Many trailer options exist but the bottom line is you want to arrive safely. Your truck and trailer combination is always a bigger concern than simply driving your show car.

My preference is to pull the smallest and lightest trailer possible with the biggest and longest truck available. My crew cab long bed pickup with dual rear wheels has kept me safe for over twenty years with very few unintentional "exciting" moments.

There are some trailer basics that can make your trip uneventful. I have my trailer brakes, breakaway brake, and wheel bearings checked annually. Always check your lug nuts prior to leaving and again at your first gas stop. I carry a spare set in case one is lost.

Having a flat tire on the trailer is never fun. I hate to wait on AAA to change a tire so I carry the correct size lug wrench, (which will invariably be a different size than Bake 15 to 20 minutes or until golden brown. needed for your vehicle) as well as a battery powered impact gun. Some friends carry an aluminum floor jack but I have found the trailer ramp made by EZ Jack to be my preference.

I usually carry two trailer spare tires and wheels. If you need a second one on the road, Tractor Supply Company carries most sizes premounted on a rim.

Always check your hitch. A receiver hitch and trailer ball with a 6,000 pound rating cannot be used if your loaded trailer exceeds 6,000 pounds. The hitch should have a weight rating equal to or larger than the ball.

Lastly, and probably most importantly, check your tires - the higher load rating the better. A tire with a load capacity of 1,750 pounds on a dual axle trailer results in a maximum weight of 7,000 pounds. That means your show car, trailer and other supplies loaded in your trailer must not exceed a total of 7,000 pounds. Inflate your tires to the recommended pressure. Soft tires increase friction and therefore more heat.

Find the date code on your tires and replace them whenever they reach five years old. Storing your trailer with the tires on the ground can lead to belt separation and flat spots so rotate the tires regularly. If trailering seems too complicated, take the easy way out. Drive your antique and enjoy the waves and admiring looks you receive along the way.

OATMEAL CARMELITAS

Pat cookie crust in pan. Topping easy—just melt down caramels.

50 caramels (14 oz. pkg.)

1/2 cup evaporated milk or light cream

2 cups flour

2 cups quick-cooking rolled oats

1 1/2 cups firmly packed brown sugar

1 teaspoon baking soda

1 cup butter, melted

1 cup (6 oz. package) semi-sweet chocolate pieces

1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts

Oven 350 degrees

Melt caramels in evaporated milk in sauce pan. Cool slightly.

Combine remaining ingredients except chocolate pieces and nuts in large mixing bowl.

Press half of the crumbs into bottom of greased 13 x 9 inch pan.

Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes

Remove from oven, sprinkle with chocolate pieces and nuts.

Spread carefully with caramel mixture.

Sprinkle with remaining crumb mixture.

Cool 1 to 2 hours.

Eat until sick.....

Who the Heck is Bertha Benz? by Ruby Rae Scalera

May 5, 1944, Bertha Benz died.

And anyone who loves cars, knows cars or has ever sat in a car, you should care. Arguably, without Bertha Benz and her spontaneity, resourcefulness and courage, Benz & Cie., later to become Daimler-Benz, might never have succeeded as a company. Without the innovation of Bertha's husband, Karl Benz, and the simultaneously innovative and terrifying Motorwagen he created, the automotive world would be a different place indeed, if it existed at all.

Credited with building what is considered the first 'car' to move under its own power, Karl Benz was facing the challenge of selling his Benz Patent Motorwagen. Many

potential customers were daunted, fearful of purchasing such a unique machine that had only ever been tested on short drives in local areas, nothing long, strenuous or challenging. At the time, no car had ever been put through anything long, strenuous or challenging.

And that's where Bertha makes her move. In a story likely as much full of adventure and fantasies as true history, the rumor says that in 1888, two years after the Motorwagen was patented, Bertha and her two teenage sons, Eugen and Richard, snuck out while Karl Benz slept, and attempted the 65 mile round trip journey to visit her mother.

It was not an easy trip. For one, there were no paved roads upon which to travel or follow, and the Benz family often rode the train routes, in order to keep from getting lost. They stopped at apothecaries along the way for a multi-purpose type of fuel called Ligroin, essentially turning a small chemistry into the world's first gas station.

Fuel lines clogged, Bertha used her hairpins to unclog them. Ignition broke, Bertha used the garter from her stocking to fix it. The trip was one of resourcefulness, creativity and innovation. She used a blacksmith to fix broken chains and a cobbler to install what became known as the world's first brake pads. Eugen and Richard, fifteen and thirteen, often pushed the twogeared Motorwagen up hills, as it was unable to do so under its own power.

But, despite all signs to the contrary, Bertha Benz knew exactly what she was doing. Her trip – the very first recorded long-distance journey in an automobile – was both a way of proving to her husband that his invention was sound, and that he needed to market and publicize more, working to gain the public's trust – after all, he was using her dowry to finance the project. And, truly, there was nothing more publicity stirring than the sight of the young Benz family, frightening everyone they drove past. The machine was so foreign that many believed the image before them, of Bertha and her sons on a selfpowered machine, was nothing less than the work of the devil himself.

Evil spirits or no, she was wildly successful in her mission. With documentation from each challenge and element of their journey, Bertha was able to recommend changes or alterations necessary to improving the car's ride, like brake pads and a third gear. She proved to Karl that publicity, including test driving, was a necessary element of building a business around his invention, creating a standard that the automobile world would follow until present day.

You can now travel the Bertha Benz Memorial Route, from Mannheim via Heidelberg to Pforzheim, the simple trip that took the car world by storm, named for the woman who made it all possible. In 2011, The Bertha Benz Challenge, part of the larger Automobile Summer 2011 which celebrated Karl Benz, took place across the Bertha Benz Memorial Route. It worked to highlight new and exciting automotive technology, looking towards the future just like the woman for which it was named.

So, 73 years after Bertha Benz passed away at the age of 95, think of that intrepid, fearless woman, the very first person to take a long distance trip in a car – any car – the one whose courage, creativity and determination created an environment for the world's first car to become successful. There are many great influences – recognized and lost to history – who have helped the automotive world in fundamental and important ways.
