And we are looking forward to another day trip to the Simeone Museum in Philadelphia. I hope you can join us for this one.


I am still looking for articles from our members on your special ride. Just give me the information and I will help you with writing the article. Send photos also.




NEW AACA BROCHURE

REPAIR, RESTORATION & MAINTENANCE

Highlights from AACA Annual Meeting Seminar By James Cross

The following are some notes from a seminar that was given by Jim Cross. This will be continued in future issues of this newsletter.

RADIATORS (NOT FOR ALUMINUM RADIATORS)

- Always use distilled water with Antifreeze
- Check for cracked blocks & blown head gaskets
 NAPA BK-700-1006
- Nitrate, Freeze Point, & PH
 - 1. WIX Filtration Corp
 - 2. Pen Ray Universal 3-way test strips Part #: T5200
- Add Supplemental Coolant Additive at oil changes
- A water wetter can also be added
- Clean Radiator per 1928 Buick manual.
 - 1. First drain the system thoroughly and after dissolving a pound of **SAL SODA** or a half-pound of lye in five gallons of water, pour mixture in the radiator after straining through a cloth. Run the engine slowly for five minutes and then drain the cleansing mixture. Again fill the system with clean water, running the engine as before; and after draining this thoroughly, the radiator may be refilled for use. Thorough flushing of the system after using the cleansing mixture is essential in view of the detrimental action of such mixtures on the hose connections.
 - 2. SAL SODA/Soda Ash is sodium carbonate Arm and Hammer Super Washing Soda
- If the radiator is dead it will have to be replaced
- Can be checked with OHM Meter (To be continued)

National Museum of Industrial History America on Wheels Museum

The museum is in a building that once housed part of the Bethlehem Steel company. It is affiliated with the Smithsonian Institution and has many of the machines from the 1876 Centennial Exhibition.

The museum is very new, just opening in August 2016 and is adding new exhibits on a regular basis.

The iron and steel section on display helped make the industrial revolution come to life.

The textile industry machinery on display was extremely interesting to the ladies in our group.

There was also a large display regarding the propane industry.

Larry Lang was our docent and gave us a wonderful tour of each display, explaining in detail how everything worked.

After our visit to the NMIH, we all had lunch at a nearby Perkins Restaurant and then traveled a few miles away to the America on Wheels Museum, where we were surprised to see 2 of Chuck & Joyce Gibson's 1942 Chevys on display.

3 cups cake flour

Streamline Test Car The McQuay-Norris Tear Droppers



McQuay-Norris was a manufacturer of high-quality aftermarket engine and chassis and chassis parts located in St. Louis, Missouri. In 1932 the Company had a series of six "Tear Drop" Test Cars built on either Model "A" Ford or 1932 Ford chassis' by the Hill Auto Body Metal Co. of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The attention-getting-egg-shaped McQuay-Norris tear droppers purpose was two -fold; for on the road testing by its Test Engineers of the Companies products, and the promotion of these auto parts around the country by the new hires.

All six of the machines were outfitted with General Tire "Balloon Jumbo" 14inch wheels and tires that the Tire Co. Engineers designed in the late 1920's. The lowpressure General "Balloon Jumbos" revolutionized tire and wheel design and manufacture. Requiring only 12-pounds of air pressure, the Balloon Jumbos promised a much smoother ride than conventional tires of the day.



Anarchy of the Early Auto

This was going to be a factual article. I had it all planned out – the history of early auto racing, where the first race was run, who competed, how fast the cars ran, if anyone was able to complete the race. It was going to be factual.

But the thing is, the history of the automobile doesn't fit nicely and neatly into a box. It is a short history, arguably less than 150 years old, and runs horizontally across automakers, countries, inventors and, yes, races. To make a list of "the first five auto races" you would have to answer questions like: Are the cars gasoline-powered? Did anyone complete the race? Did more than one person compete? Was it legal for them to race? And other odd, nearly incomparable queries that scratch the surface of just how complicated the early



And for that reason, and many more, I've come to a deep and abiding love and respect for early autos, not dissimilar from the love and respect you might feel for a child attempting to learn to walk. It is chaotic and insane and goes against every natural instinct, but miracle upon miracle, they might actually succeed.

Because in addition to sharing some years with the age of the Wild West, the early automotive industry was a Wild West itself. Take for instance the Duryea Motor Wagon story I shared recently, where the original race date had to be pushed back because not a single car was completed in time to qualify. After that, only 6 of the original 93 cars registered made it to the starting line and only 2 to the finish line.

For a moment, let's forget the era of '53 Corvettes and '64 1/2 Mustangs and even Ford Model Ts. Go earlier. Think bigger. Tune your mind to the era where the auto industry wasn't an industry at all but thousands of inventors hacking away at ideas in their garages and barns. Think of an era where electric cars might have succeeded, only there wasn't enough electricity between the cities to go very far. Remember that the first cross-country auto race included nearly as much time digging wheels out of the mud as it did driving, as roads in their long-distance and truest sense, would not come about until nearly two decades into the 20th century.

Those early years of cars were made up of calamity and near catastrophe, of police officers pulling over new-fangled contraptions they had never seen before, of laws made after they had been broken, of car crashes and drunk drivers because hell, they honestly didn't know better.

As of late, I've become quite a sucker for the anarchy of the early auto. Could you imagine having a car world today with two thousand individual automakers? Think about the concept of using your license plate as your driver's license and taking it off if you were going to drive another car. Think, terrifyingly, of the idea that you didn't need to pass any sort of exam to drive on the open roads. (This is actually scarier than you think, as many states didn't require you to pass a driver's exam until the 1950s, ending with South Dakota in 1959...)

And the truth is, the car industry hasn't stopped being a little wild and a little insane. No, it's not quite the nihilistic age of runaway horseless carriages on muddy streets with no blinkers, windshield wipers or seatbelts. But cars have gone through eras and waves that no one could have ever predicted before, just as no one could have ever predicted their birth. Hot rods? Madness. Muscle cars. Call an exorcist. Green technology? A phasing out of manual transmissions? Government-issued safety standards?

And yes, every time a new wave of the weird and unpredictable comes along, someone is bound to throw up their hands and say that ain't the way a car is supposed to be. But really, how can we possibly say the way a car is supposed to be when cars have changed so very many times since those early barns and garages and stables?

Am I a fan of the self-driving auto? Not particularly. But I wouldn't call myself a car enthusiast if I didn't recognize

that autonomous cars are not a deviation from classics of yesteryear, but an homage, a kin, the great, great grandchild of horseless carriages, mixed in along the lines with sports cars and supercars and muscle cars and family cars and sedans and all the rest. In order to survive, classic cars have to be just a little bit wild, a little bit weird and a little bit off the beaten track.

After all, when cars were first invented, there weren't any tracks at all.
