

# Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance Celebrates the Seventieth Anniversary of Tucker's Car of Tomorrow

The 2018 Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance celebrated the 70th anniversary of the Tucker 48 with a featured class of its own. Preston Tucker's sleek postwar "car of tomorrow" fitted with



three-headlights, was a crowd pleaser and one of the highlights of the event.

The Preston Tucker story has been told many times and is often romanticized with folklore and fiction. Although, Tucker was an early promoter of rear engine placement, unit body construction, and safety features including crash compartments, and breakaway glass. Tucker the Automaker combined all of these features in his own sleek fastback streamline design.

Even before the release of the Tucker feature film "The Man and His Dream," skyrocketing sale prices in the auction arena ensured that the public believed this car was exceptional and worth owning and preserving. Due to the continued interest and fame associated with Tucker's car seventy-years after the last one was built, forty-seven of the fifty-one that were constructed have survived.

For most car lovers seeing one Tucker is a memorable event, but a gathering of twelve displayed at one of the most prestigious car events in the world is unforgettable, and likely a once in a lifetime privilege. Five of my favorite Tuckers are highlighted below along with others on display at the Concours.

In addition to the Tucker feature class, this year's Concours d'Elegance featured a surprising number of remarkable postwar American Cars. These and other highlights from the show will be in part two of my Pebble Beach report coming soon.

# Your Spot at the Car Show By Bill Flitcraft

My apologies to Bill Flitcraft for leaving out the last 3 paragraphs of his article last month. Here is his entire article as it should have been.

There has been a lot of discussion lately about getting young people involved in our hobby. Many clubs are actively soliciting new younger members while others are wringing their hands and wondering what to do. While a club wide initiative is certainly worthwhile and encouraging to see, I have found another avenue to complement such activities. If you are doing likewise, please keep up the good work. Although the results may not be seen quickly I do think at some time in the future they will prove beneficial.

I have recently been attending local car shows and cruise ins with my newly restored Streamliner. It is fun to sit in a lawn chair and "people watch." I have been able to identify who will stop and look at my 1948 Pontiac and those who will give it a cursory look and keep on walking. Invariably, folks over 50 years old will stop and look and often times want to talk about it. On the other hand most people under 50 years old will not even turn their head. I understand this completely. People are interested in things that interest them and I don't find fault in that.

Car shows/cruise ins are a relatively new concept. A few years ago car clubs used them to show off their rides and have a social get-together. As their popularity grew, businesses started to invite clubs to display their cars in their parking lots as a way to drum up some extra walk-in traffic. Soon entire towns and cities were getting in on the act. Banners were hung, streets were closed, downtown shops were opened late and registration fees were being charged. Without a doubt, all this has been a boon to the hobby.

There are two kinds of people who attend a car show. The owners of a car who display their car in the show and people who are slightly interested in cars and want a night out. Both kinds are needed. While sitting in my lawn chair, I can usually tell who has a classic car parked in the show and who has a modern car parked in the parking lot.

Getting back to my point about getting young people interested in the hobby. Whenever a young person stops to look at my car I take the opportunity to talk to him or her and put a friendly face with the old car. I try to do this without being too obnoxious or sounding too old.

I was recently attending a local show and had three young boys, my guess is they were between 16 to 18 years old, stop and give my car a good going over. They were examining the interior and after a few minutes I approached them and said jokingly, "You guys don't even know what half of that stuff is in there do you?" They chuckled a bit and one boy confessed he didn't know what *any* of the stuff in there was. One boy spoke up and said, "What are those handles for on the doors" (I kid you not).

At first I thought he was pulling my leg. But as I explained they were cranks to wind the windows up and down I realized it was quite possible he had never seen one. I then opened the door and demonstrated how they worked. They asked about the other small crank on the door and then I showed them it was for opening and closing the front vent window. A front vent

window, they were genuinely amazed. I then said the radio was AM only. They shook their heads in disbelief.

I then told them the car did not come with an air conditioner and that you had to open the front vent windows and also the cowl vent to get cooled off while driving down the road. Again, they were amazed. They then started examining the engine bay. They had never seen or even heard of a straight 8 engine, couldn't believe a car that old had a windshield washer and asked about the big, round, black thing on top of the engine (oil bath air cleaner).

In total time we probably only spent about fifteen or twenty minutes talking about the car. I never got their names but I like to think I made some friends that day. They each thanked me for talking to them and shook my hand before they left.

A short time later I noticed a grown man with his young son trying to take a picture of his boy standing next to my car. I could tell the dad really liked the car. I quickly walked up to them and said, "I think it would be a better picture if you had your son sit in the car behind the steering wheel". The boy looked up at me and with eyes as big as half dollars said, "Really?" I opened the door and let him in the drivers seat. (There were probably other car guys there that would have been appalled if they saw what I did. But I didn't care.) The father of the boy went nuts taking pictures of his son in the car. We chatted awhile about the car, he shook my hand and they both thanked me many times before they walked away.

Before the night was over another mother with a young son stopped to look. I over heard her trying to explain some things about the car to him. Again, I couldn't let the opportunity pass. I asked if he wanted to see the inside of the car and of course he did. I opened the passenger side door and pointed out the clock, radio, heater and defroster controls and a few other things. Before she left she thanked me for taking the time to talk to her son. I was glad to do it.

To be sure, there were many older folks that stopped and talked to me about the car. They asked how much horsepower the straight 8 engine produced (107), or the amount of time I spent restoring it (approx. 14,318 hrs.), or the color of the paint (Mariner Blue), or how long I have owned it (since 1969) and a host of other questions, all of which I was happy to answer. But I think I did more for the hobby by taking a few moments with some wide eyed youngsters and maybe introducing them to a new world. And all it cost me was a little bit of time.

# Have you changed your brake fluid?

Brake fluid used in most of our collector cars is glycol ether based (DOT 3 or DOT 4). It is hygroscopic which means that it will absorb moisture from the air it contacts. The brake fluid will still allow proper braking but internal corrosion in the master cylinder, brake lines and wheel cylinders may lead to potential problems. The master cylinder fill cap is typically vented so moist air does come in contact with brake fluid in the reservoir. Fluid change intervals recommended vary widely (typically 1 year to three years). I'm probably not alone in neglecting to change fluid in spite of the recommendations.

A recent brake problem with my '49 Buick may cause me to pay more attention to brake fluid changes on my cars in the future. I noticed poor pedal feel and uncertain stopping distances on a car that had always had good brakes. I checked brake fluid level in the master cylinder and it was OK but I noticed that the fluid had a dark color instead of the clear color of new fluid. It was evident that it was time for a complete flush of the system as well as rebuilding the master cylinder.

The early Buicks have a master cylinder mounted to the frame rail under the steering column and it is difficult to reach from underhood.



I used a long wobble socket extension to remove the fill cap and a pneumatic brake bleeder to drain all of the old fluid from the system by accessing each wheel cylinder bleed valve. I then removed the master cylinder by disconnecting the brake line, the brake pedal linkage and the two bolts holding the casting to the frame. I had ordered a rebuild kit but was fortunate to find a rebuilt unit in my spare parts stash. I tore it down and the internal parts were all new so it was used to replace the old unit.

I was concerned that old fluid and residue would still be in the brake lines and wheel cylinders so I used a new bottle of brake fluid to flush the system. I filled the replaced master cylinder and used the bleeder system at each wheel to pull the new fluid through the lines until the fluid was clear. My hoist got a workout as I had to refill the master reservoir after purging each wheel position. Once I had clear fluid at each wheel I refilled the master cylinder reservoir, checked pedal position and did a road test. The brakes were now back to normal.

Examination of the master cylinder that was removed showed that the piston seals had deteriorated and there was sludge built up in the bottom of the reservoir. The probable cause was corrosion caused by water absorbed in the old brake fluid.



Experts warn us to always use a fresh can of brake fluid so that moisture will contaminate a can that has been opened and then stored on the shelf. At around \$6.00 per quart, it is good insurance to buy a fresh can.

I'm embarrassed to admit what I found when I checked my log book for the car. I had rebuilt the master cylinder, replaced wheel cylinders and brake fluid years ago. (22 years to be exact and 15,000 miles travelled since then) I was fortunate that I'd had no problems before. You can be sure I'll check my other cars right away. How about you?

My advice is to check your system and records to assure that your cars are OK.

## **AMERICAN AUTOMOBILES**

(100 years of The American Auto,

The first self-propelled land vehicle goes to French Cugnot in 1770 for a steam powered artillery tractor.

In 1865 Sylvester Roper added a steam engine on a carriage to create a self-propelled runabout.

Ranson Eli Olds improved his three wheeled steam vehicles in 1886.

Lucius D. Copeland built a steam powered bicycle in early 1880.

DeLamarre De Bouteville patents a carburetor in 1884.

Karl Benz and Gottlieb Daimler earned credit as developers of the first workable gasoline-powered vehicles in 1886.

William Morrison drives an electric vehicle in Chicago, IL in 1888.

Early vehicles that claim title to the first American car include Charles Lambert and Henry Nadig, both built in 1891.

Rene Panhard of France produced the first vehicle with a front mounted internal combustion engine driving rear wheels via a gearbox and driveshaft in 1891.

J. Frank Duryea and brother Charles operate the one-cylinder "Buggyaut" on September 21, 1893 in Springfield, MA. It is considered the first successful gas engine vehicle built in America.

Elmer and Edgar Apperson and Jonathan Maxwell build the single cylinder Haynes, conceived by Elwood Haynes. It is tested in the fall of 1893 and operated by July 4, 1894.

Henry Ford builds his first working engine in 1893, then starts work on his first vehicle.

Henry G. Morris and Pedro G. Salom apply for a patent on the Electrobat electric motorcar in early 1894.

# RECIPE OF THE MONTH

# **MAPLE & PECAN PORK CHOPS**

From the kitchen of Marge & Larry Irwin Ingredients:

¼ cup maple syrup

¼ cup dark corn syrup¼ cup chopped toasted pecans

Up to 4 pork chops

Salt (optional) & pepper

2 teaspoons Dijon mustard (yellow will work too)

2 tablespoons Corn Starch

½ teaspoons ground ginger

1 tablespoons corn oil

#### **DIRECTIONS:**

Combine corn syrup, maple syrup and pecans in a small bowl and set aside.

Sprinkle pork chops with salt (optional) and pepper.

Spread Dijon mustard on both sides of chops.

Combine corn starch and ginger in a small dish. Spread both sides of corn starch mixture over chops.

Heat corn oil in a large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add pork chops: cook 3 to 4 minutes on each side until browned. Reduce heat to medium low. Drizzle syrup mixture over chops. Cover and cook 4 to 5 minutes or until chops are tender, turning over once.

Drizzle the pan drippings over chops and serve.



## Find New AACA Members

The Antique Automobile Club of America is "America's premiere resource for the collectible vehicle community!
