Sunday November 4th

Ray and I traveled to Mississippi with Barbara Fraser (Ray's sister) and Terry Shelton and Miriam Willis. We trailered our 2 Model A's in our trailer and arrived in Mississippi on Saturday, November 3rd.

There were several pre-tour places for us to visit. Ray and I visited the Natchez experience museum directly across the street from the hotel. The hospitality room manned by our hosts, the Louisiana region AACA, provided us with such a variety of items including meatballs and sandwiches and snacks for lunch so most of us just stayed in for lunch.

We had a lovely opening banquet at Bowie's Restaurant where they served an assortment of food of the local area i.e. gumbo, jambalaya along with some regular assortment of dishes.

Charlie Froehlich introduced the Mayor of Natchez who welcomed us to his city and then Charlie introduced Earl Beauchamp the originator of the AACA Sentimental Tour. Earl gave us a brief history of how the tour originated. Charlie then spoke regarding the week ahead.







Monday November 5th

We visited the Stanton Hall and the Longwood mansions that were owned by cotton plantation owners. This is really beautiful touring in the Southland of hoop skirts and mansions

We enjoyed a box lunch at the Jefferson Military College where there was a museum about the boys military school. The curator gave a short talk about the college during the civil war.

After lunch we traveled a few miles to the First Presbyterian church of

Natchez Historic Photographs exhibit was housed. There were hundreds of beautiful antique photographs of Natchez and her people from past years.

We ended this day after 26 total miles. It was a lovely day to tour.

Tuesday November 6th

Today we started our tour with a visit to the Delta Music Museum just over the bridge in Ferriday, Louisiana, the birthplace of Jerry Lee Lewis (Great Balls of Fire), Mickey Gilley, Rev. Jimmy

Swaggart and commentator Howard K. Smith. The museum celebrates the accomplishments of these men together with many other music celebrities.

Our next stop was the Frogmore Cotton Plantation and Gins. We were shown a very interesting movie of how cotton is harvested now with all its mechanical machines and then given a tour of the historic outbuildings that have been preserved which replicate life on the cotton plantation in the 1700's and 1800's prior to the modern machines that harvest the cotton now.

Lunch was at a local reception hall where we enjoyed a bowl of the Louisiana Gumbo with chicken and sausage, potato salad and sweet potato, made especially for our group by a local chef. After lunch we were free to tour some of the local areas.

This evening the Tour included an all you can eat ice cream social from 7-8 pm.

Wednesday, November 7th

Today we checked out of the Natchez Hampton and traveled with all of our luggage in the Model A to Vicksburg via the Natchez Trace Parkway. We managed to get everything in the back seat and still leave enough room for Barbara, Rays sister.

We got on the Natchez Trace Parkway just 2.5 miles from the hotel. Our first stop was at Emerald Mound, the second largest Indian Mound in the USA.

Our next stop was Rocky Springs which also was our Lunch stop where we enjoyed a great box lunch. Due to the slight rain, most of us ate in our cars. We then went up to see what was once the 1860's town Rocky Springs. We walked what had been the actual trace road to Rocky Springs. The only building still standing was a little church and cemetery. The church still has services once a month. We then traveled another 24 miles on the trace to exit the Parkway and head for Vicksburg another 25 miles away. We

traveled approximately 106 miles today. Dinner tonight is on our own but the Hampton is providing us with a wine and beer reception this evening.

Thursday November 8th.

Today started out very rainy. Our first stop was the Vicksburg National Military Park. We decided it was best to ride the route around the park and hopefully the rain would subside before going into town. It was a good idea since by the time we finished the park route the rain had stopped.

We finished up the National Military Park with the Union's gunboat, USS Cairo Museum. The Cairo was the first vessel sunk by an electrically detonated torpedo mine during the war of 1862.







The gunboat was raised from the river in the 1960's and was amazingly preserved because of the silt at the River bottom.

We found a lovely place for lunch as it was getting late. Lunch on the 10th floor of an old bank building. Great views of the Yazoo River at "10 South Rooftop Bar & Grill".

Some of the group visited the Old Courthouse Museum and others went to the Old Depot Museum.

Vicksburg is a lovely quaint town.

This afternoon around 3 pm a local Vicksburg car enthusiast named Pat Cashman and wife Barbara has opened their garage to show our group his 16 car

collection. He has also offered to help with any repairs that anyone may have since he has lifts and tools available.

Friday, November 9th.

Today we left Vicksburg to follow the Great River Road to Natchez.

Our first stop was the Grand Gulf Military Park. There was a very nice museum and several outbuildings. We also enjoyed a coffee break with hot coffee and donuts. The coffee was welcomed as it was raining off and on and quite cold. It never got above 48 degrees all day.

There was a huge fireplace in the open pavilion where we had our coffee and donuts. Everyone warmed themselves in front of the fire

Our next stop was Port Gibson "The City too beautiful to Burn" as per General Grant. The town of Port Gibson were thrilled to have us visit their several historic buildings.

We then traveled 2 miles away to the Claiborne County Multi Purpose Center where we enjoyed a very nice lunch.

After lunch many visited the Alcorn State University and the Ruins of Windsor. Alcorn is America's oldest historically black land-grant institution. Windsor was a magnificent antebellum home built in 1860 that burned in 1890. We then traveled back to Natchez and readied for the closing Banquet.

The closing banquet was in the beautiful Hotel Vue overlooking the Mississippi River. We had a lovely dinner of local dishes including catfish and crawfish bisque and much more with delicious pecan pie for dessert. Charlie Frolich was the master of ceremony with the help of Chuck Crane and Marty Roth. Of course Earl Beauchamp definitely had a part in the program.



Awards were given for Oldest Driver (83), Youngest Driver (36), Oldest Car 1928 HupMobile, Ladies Choice and Hard Luck awards.

AUTOMOTIVE TRIVIA

AMERICAN AUTOMOBILES

(100 years of The American Auto,
By James M. Flammang, Copyright 1999
and Auto Editors of Consumer Guide)
With permission from Publications International, Ltd.
Last Month we began this timeline starting with a 1770 steam
powered artillery tractor to an 1894 Electrobat motor car.

The Stanley Streamer Company starts production in the spring of 1898.

Thomas B. Jeffery builds his first auto that will evolve into the Rambler, 1898.

(Alexander) Winston Motor Carriage Company enters production and sells 22 autos in 1898.

Earle C. Anthony, at 17 years of age, builds a crude electric runabout. Later opens one of the world's first gasoline stations, 1898.

General Electric and Waverly Electric enters the auto industry 1898

John Wilkinson builds an air cooled, four-cylinder engine with valvein-head configuration, which leads to the motor used in Franklin motorcars.

The Porter Company's steam powered "perfect automobile" lasted only through 1900-1901.

In 1899 the Pittsburgh Motor Vehicle Company becomes the Autocar Company.

James Ward Packard constructs his first automobile and runs on November 6, 1899 in Warren, Ohio.

Production figures for 1899-1900: Columbia built 1500, Locomobile 750, Winston 100, Packard 49, Stanley 30, Stearns 20, Knox 15, Oldsmobile 11.

Packard introduced the first steering wheel to replace the usual tiller in 1900.

Introduced in 1899 as the American, the renamed Gasmobile appeared at the New York Auto Show in 1900, but left the auto scene in 1902, after about 140 examples had been produced. Features included an automatic starting device.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

<u>Crab Bisque</u> (Makes about 1/2 gallon) From Kitchen of Beth Bradway

4 ribs celery & 1 large onion chopped fine 4 Tbsp.. Butter Salt & Pepper to taste

1-2 Tbsp. cornstarch

24 oz. Clam Juice or chicken stock (clam is better)

1 quart heavy cream (or I have used half & half)

1 Tbsp.. Each Dry Mustard, Old Bay Seasoning & Worcestershire sauce

6 oz. sherry (optional)

1 lb. crabmeat

Cook onion, celery, butter, salt & pepper till the onion and celery are soft.

Add spices and Worcestershire sauce and stir.

Add clam juice and bring to a boil

Add heavy cream and bring to a boil (Keep an eye on it)

Mix cornstarch and add water.

When it boils I turn off heat and add enough cornstarch mixture to thicken the soup.

Add Crab meat and heat through.

Waxing Nostalgic

I recently read in the Yankton, SD newspaper that the NECCO candy company is going out of business. NECCO stands for the New England Confectionary Co. They are the makers of the nickel size candy wafers and had been around for 171 years. They also produced the little valentine hearts with the cute sayings printed on them. This got me to thinking • about other candies from my childhood that I see no more. Things like Walnut Crush, Chuckles, Butter Brickle. The Walnut crush and Butter Brickle had unique tastes. I know nothing now that tastes like the Walnut Crush. The Butter Brickle is very similar to today's Heath Bar. Most of this candy came from Grandma and Grandpa. I especially remember Chuckles which were about 5 little blocks of candy in one wrapper and resembled larger square gum drops. Grandpa would bring them home from work at Goodyear in his lunch box, and since he had false teeth, I know he couldn't eat them.

Were the swap meets we attended exciting enough as we searched for the next automotive treasure a suitable replacement? Or was there some other 'special event' we attended such as tours and AACA meets that we attended a replacement for the things in my memory. I don't know. He has the car bug. The closest thing I can think of right now is the recent phenomenon, called cars and coffee. In our area it is a 8:00 to 12:00 come and go show at a local auto museum. No trophies no classes just come and have fun. If you have not participated in one of these, check them out, and if possible take a young person with you. You might just be making a memory for their trip down nostalgia lane when they grow up.
