

DOES YOUR GASOLINE KNOCK FOR YOU By Larry Irwin

Thirty years in the oil industry you would think something would be learned about gasoline. But, like most employees the concern is the same as the general public. Get in my automobile, fill it with fuel to get me from point A to point B. Automobiles have their own long history but let us talk about the fuel history that takes you from point A to point B. Refineries make just two types of gasoline, Motor Grade and Premium. Mid-grade is a blend of high test (Premium) and regular (Motor Grade). In most cases today mid-grade has all but disappeared.

Gasoline additives have been around since the beginning of the 20th century. Henry Ford was one of the first to use an unknown product before gasoline was developed as a useable product. It was what we call "Ethanol" or an environmental equivalent used in his first combustion engine. At the time gasoline was an unusable product and was often poured out and burned. As combustion engines developed gasoline became the useable product since it was so cheap to produce. It was not until around 1920 or so that General Motors discovered that lead additive help prevent engine knock and improved engine performance. Benzene, alcohols and ethanol were introduced but lead was the preferred choice since it was so cheap to produce.

During the 1960's and 70's environmental studies started to become major issues. It was discovered that lead was a major pollution to the air and water. In 1970 the Clean Air act outlawed lead as a gasoline additive and it disappeared from the gas pumps. The automotive and oil industries was working on a variety of other products to improve environmental contamination issues as well as engine performance. Along came methyl tertbutyl ether also known as MTBE.

MTBE was known to have a low threshold detected by noise and taste. BP Oil and Sun Oil created a join venture in Marcus Hook, PA to build a plant to produce MTBE for the market. It lasted around two years before it was discovered the fix to life and contamination were not worth the cure. Groundwater was at a major risk. Back comes "Ethanol"

Refining improvement over the years have

now made ethanol much cheaper with refining advancements producing useable quantities. It has developed to improve gasoline performance by raising octane levels in Motor Grade from 83 octane to 87. Smog and other pollutions have been reduced to acceptable levels with the laws established currently. Lead can no longer be used in modern vehicles due to the damage it does the catalytic converters.

Ever wonder how branded stations get their product if the refinery only makes two grades of gasoline? Exxon, Shell or BP Oil gets their product often from the same location, often through an exchange agreement, but that is a different story. Before the arrival, the refinery or distribution center injects the patented additive into the gasoline so it can be sold as a branded product. Companies such as Wawa, Royal Farms and others private label sellers gets bulk product ordered daily based on the best price available.

The issue now is with winter coming on and classics being stored. Ethanol is a hygroscopic, meaning it can absorb moisture from the atmosphere. The problem is when classics are allowed to sit for a while. The fix is easier than expected. 1. The last fill up should be with a premium grade of gasoline. Higher octane gasoline will age better than a lower octane product. 2. Use an additive fuel treatment added to the gasoline currently added to marine engines such as "STA-BIL or SMB HIGH MILEAGE treatment. There are others but the treatment is needed to keep your "Toys" in good condition and have them ready for Spring.


The Four Vagabonds (1915-1924)

Can you possibly imagine Elon Musk, Bill Gates, Steve Jobs, and David Attenborough taking a two-week camping trip together? Can you imagine them doing it every year for ten years?

This is exactly what Henry Ford, Thomas Edison, Harvey Firestone, and John Burroughs did from 1915 until 1921 when Burroughs died, and then for another three years after that. By all accounts, it was an amazing gathering of some of the brightest minds and industry leaders of the day. It was early in the days of recreational road trips and camping, and the "Four Vagabonds" (as they called themselves) annual drive became a national event. You might say they were the first "glampers."

A comprehensive book on the topic was written by Jeff Guinn and published in July 2019. The book is professionally researched; using primary sources and includes not just the day-to-day events, but also the thoughts of the participants as written in their journals. Thomas Edison's wife Mina describes one trip as, "so elaborate and so fussy that there is no charm in it." There is also a bit of archival video footage of some of the trips. Watching the shenanigans of these four is interesting even if staged.


It was wonderful to see everyone. The South Jersey Region also advertised that there would be a Club meeting, since we have been unable to have any formal meetings since March.



CHIP HUBLER'S 1939 BUICK

Chip Hubler's 1939 Buick convertible coupe Model 46C certainly makes an impression either sitting still or riding down the road. The yellow convertible stands out in a crowd.

Chip's interest in the 1939 Buick can be traced back to the 1989 Fall AACA meet in Hershey. Chip was there with his friend, John Ruth, who at that time was the owner of the car. Chip didn't even know that John wanted to sell the Buick until he noticed a sign John had made indicating that fact.

Chip said nothing to John at that time but went to see John after Hershey and let him know that he was interested in striking a deal for the Buick. The Evolution of the Corvette By Bob Parrish Vice President - National Awards

There have been eight generations of Corvettes in its 68 years of continuous production.

The C1 or "solid axle" Corvettes were built from 1953 to 1962. Only 300 were built the first year, 1953. The fabled Chevy V8 engine appeared in the 1955 model at 265 cu. in. which was enlarged to 283 cu. in. in 1957. The Corvette 4 speed and Fuel Injection were introduced in '57 for the very first time.

The second generation, C2 (1963-1967), saw the birth of the Stingray, increases in power to the 327 engines to a top rating of 375 fuel-injected horsepower. The styling of the "mid-years" was, and remains one of the most admired automotive designs ever. Big Block, 396 and 427 cu. in. engines were first offered in 1965. They spelled the end of fuel injection in Corvettes until 1985. Full 4-wheel disc brakes came to the Corvette in 1965.

Launched in 1968 and produced through 1982, the C3 generation had a makeover styled after the concept Mako Shark design and offered T-tops for the first time. The 454 cu. in. engine debuted during this time, as did the Federal Government's emission control mandates which killed horsepower. In 1970-1972 there were approximately 60 ZR1-optioned cars built.

There were no 1983 Corvettes produced for sale due to delays in the manufacturing quality of the new C4. Once launched, C4 production ran from 1984-1996 and gained in sales to those buyers that wanted an affordable Corvette for everyday use. In 1990 Chevrolet released the second "King of the Hill" ZR-1 and its LT5 engine designed by Lotus and built by Mercruiser. 1994 was the last year of this version of the ZR-1.

The C5 (1997-2004) was the most advanced Corvette ever for the time with the introduction of the high performance ZO6, and continued improvement in the suspension and braking systems.

The C6 generation (2005-2013) introduced the LS2 engine, producing a base 400 horsepower and 400 pounds of torque. The ZR1 returned in 2009.

Looking at the C7 (2014-2019) finds the return of the Stingray badging and the production of the ZR1, super Corvette in 2019. It came with a super charged 6.2 liter V8 engine producing an astounding 755 horsepower and superior performance.

The newest generation, C8 - 2020 is also a revolutionary design: having a mid-engine and total body styling change, with exceptional horsepower and performance gains.

To commemorate the Corvette evolution, the Tidewater Region, AACA in conjunction with its next Annual Meet, plans to have a Corvette representing each year of production. You can learn more by visiting TRAACA.com.


