

BOARDWALK HALL ORGAN TOUR

April 7, 2022 By Chuck Gibson



Thursday April 7 dawned as a bright and sunny day for our trip to Atlantic City to tour Boardwalk Hall and see the restoration progress of the world's largest pipe organ. Actually, only the second part of the previous sentence is true because the weather could not have been gloomier, so no one was daring enough to bring an old car for the 40mile trip. However, 14 of us showed up and enjoyed a hearty breakfast at the Malaga Diner then headed east toward the ocean. The drive down Rt. 40 was uneventful, and we had reserved parking inside the building. We were met in the garage by the Membership and Events Coordinator, Scott Banks, who would lead our tour. The Historic Organ Restoration Committee is responsible for the restoration of the two pipe organs located inside the Hall including the theater organ in the Ballroom at the boardwalk end of the building. And Scott has incredible knowledge of the history of the building and took the time to point out many details which wouldn't normally be seen. As noon was approaching, it was time for our private organ recital

provided by local organist, Scott Briener. We were treated to several pieces of music to show off the sound colors of the organ including a familiar Scott Joplin piece and a familiar Beatles piece. The last time we toured the organ six years ago, only 23% functioned and now that number has increased to 53%!

Scott, Chuck and the Curator of Organs, Nathan Bryson (also an AACA member) then provided a detailed tour of the inside of the pipe organ beginning in the



main blower room in the basement level of the building. Walking through the chambers of this incredible instrument gave our members a good idea of the amount of work this restoration project takes. It's not unlike restoring a car where problems are encountered requiring careful planning and after you've completed the task you find it has to be done a second time because there's a problem! Yep, it happens here too! This instrument has not only endured normal deterioration, but major hurricane damage in 1944 and damage from other construction projects that have taken place inside the building. There are 33,112 pipes ranging in size from the size of a pencil to 64' long X 24"

HOW AND WHEN IT BEGAN

The gathering of Antique Cars began a long time ago and has evolved

1931, as the Philadelphia Automobile Trade Association readied itself for the unveiling of the new models at the annual Philadelphia Automobile Show, it was decided to invite early cars to drive under their own power to the exposition. The owners of several old cars were located and persuaded to crank them up and drive to what the trade association billed as the First Antique Automobile Derby. This event was successful enough to warrant repeating in subsequent years. With each year's derby, the number of cars participating increased. When a person was going to participate the car had to be 25 years or older and the participants were required to drive from any point 25 miles from Philadelphia. At the time of starting, a telegram had to be sent announcing the starting time. Time checks and traffic tests were the basis for derby prizes. In addition, there were manufacturers' trophies, prizes for showing cars, and other awards in the form of cash – no small incentive during the years of the Great Depression.

In **January of 1935**, in bitter cold, these car owners again sat at Convention Hall and talked about cars and their complaints of how this event was handled. Most disgust was that the there was a general lack of recognition for the car owner participants. Two of the people were Ted Fiala and Frank Abramson who were in their 1907 Waltham-Orient* which they had found in a barn near the area of the present Philadelphia airport. *This car had not run for 25 years and these two men had it running now and its single cylinder was banging away. This is what was then called a "restoration." These two fellows thought this Antique Derby sounded like fun and off they went to meet other old car lovers.*


After the event, in September of 1935 they sent a letter to those who had been there and inquired if they would be interested in forming a club and perhaps upgrading the rules and prizes of this event and forming a club that would promote the "hobby of the Antique car."

A second letter was sent October 28, 1935, requesting everyone to attend a meeting to be held at the Automobile Club of Philadelphia. The letter included reply cards and most were returned with a positive YES! The new 1936 automobiles were due to be introduced in Philadelphia with the running of the Fifth Annual Antique Automobile Derby on November 11, and this time the car owners were going to become organized. **The year was 1935**. The agenda for the meeting was as follows: "organization of the club and discussion of better organization and more prize money. The original founding members and their cars at that time:

*The 1907 Waltham-Orient was co-owned by Frank Abramson and Theodore Fiala

By **1936** a constitution was created and by 1938 a magazine was in effect. Volume 1, **Number 1 was published in 1937 called the Bulletin of the Antique Automobile** and edited by Theodore (Ted) Fiala. The logo was the Duryea. It was one of the first production vehicles built and the Duryea family was involved in the development of the club.

How and When it Began (Continued)

The **drawing** that we know so well was **designed in 1939** by Herbert Van Haagen of Upper Darby, PA. Within 5 years the membership was 115 members from 15 states and 2 foreign countries.

A new tradition began on March 1, 1941, when a club banquet was held "to stimulate interest among our members and help get them into the proper frame of mind for the coming spring activities." This first annual banquet took place at Bookbinder's Restaurant in Philadelphia "to do honor to the memory of the pioneers whose efforts made possible the automobile as it is today." There were 78 members attending and speakers were famed opera singer and early car collector James Melton and famous race driver Ralph De Palma. Another tradition took hold as well – life membership. Thomas McKean of Chepachet, Rhode Island, became the first active life member of the AACA, entitling him to all rights and privileges of the organization for life. Communication and opportunities for those who enjoyed these "older" cars to gather was discussed.

The war years were a difficult time for the old car hobby, and AACA. In the months and years to come, the future of the hobby itself required the same steadfastness as the war effort itself. "Our mutual enthusiasm in the Antique Automobile Club of America approaches the spring of 1942 under conditions which are disturbing and fraught with uncertainties," wrote AACA President Hyde W. Ballard. "Our customary plans for acquiring and reconditioning old cars have not materialized; instead we are directly or indirectly bending effort toward victory for the United Nations." These efforts included involvement in materials acquisition, not the least of which were the rubber drives. As it pertained to the hobby, looking beyond the unforeseen postwar years, rubber-shortage questions arose as they pertained to tire availability. There was also hope that scrap metal drives would result in the unearthing of old cars once thought lost to time; although it was feared that some museum pieces may not be spared. Along with gasoline rationing, it was mandated that old vehicles be chopped up for the scrap campaign. Car enthusiasts rose up however, and an appeal to exempt antique motor vehicles from the scrap drives reached the War Production Board's Conservation Division, which issued the following statement: "An old vehicle, other than a carefully preserved antique, may be considered junk, if it is incapable of giving useful transportation service and cannot be put in running order in sixty days." This time in the history of the automobile hobby saw the beginnings of several vast "hoards" of early cars, including the legendary Barney Pollard collection outside of Detroit. Barney had accumulated many early and rare vehicles for years and to store them, would suspend them on end from cables strung between poles, enclosing them with tin and wood siding. Protected from view, they survived the scrap drives.

In 1949, Fred Nicholson retired and Mr. Donald A. Gallager became the new Chief Judge. Two more categories were introduced, these being for Model T Ford and High Wheeler cars

DUCT TAPE & WEBSITESBy Fred Trusty Vice President-Membership



Duck Tape was invented by a division of Johnson and Johnson in 1943 for military use in WWII. They wanted a tape that was waterproof and strong enough to keep moisture out of ammunition boxes. Originally, it only came in army green. It's believed that soldiers started calling it Duck Tape because it was green and shed water like a duck. It was strong, waterproof, and adhesive backed, so soldiers started using it for repairing just about anything: jeeps, guns, aircraft, and in an emergency, to temporarily close up wounds. During the housing boom after the war, soldiers were using Duck Tape that they brought back with them for all sorts of things.

Then someone got the idea to market it as a means to seal heating ducts and the name changed to Duct Tape and the color changed to silver. Ironically, you shouldn't use duct tape to seal HVAC duct work. It can become brittle and fail.

What does Duct Tape have to do with AACA? The antique car hobby has declining membership for several years now. Older members are passing on and even though we do a fair job at recruiting new members, we aren't keeping pace with the rate of attrition. We need a recruiting tool that is strong and sticky.

Let's say that I need to find a company that can rebuild the power brake booster on my 1962 Oldsmobile Super 88? On my computer, in the Google search bar, I type in "power brake booster rebuilding service" and voila pages of companies. What if I want to find an antique car club in Louisville, KY? In the search bar I type, "antique car clubs near Louisville KY" and guess what comes up? A list of car clubs in the Louisville area with Kyana Region AACA in the number one slot at the top of the page. There's a reason why it's number one. It's called Search Engine Optimization (SEO), which could be a future article in itself. A couple of years ago, the Kyana Region updated its website, kyanaregionaaca.com. We added lots of pictures of events and a page on how to become a member of Kyana plus a link to the AACA website, aaca.org. In 2020 we signed up 19 new members and for 2021 we have 29, so far. Guess where most of the new members found out about Kyana? Could websites be our digital Duct Tape? Some regions have great websites. Some don't have one at all. Think of the potential if every AACA region and chapter had a great website?

If we want the hobby to continue, we have to go digital. If your region or chapter doesn't have a website, AACA has a team of webmasters that are ready to help you build one. We have a free website template and with the help of our webmasters you can quickly have your own website up and running. Just contact Mary Bartemeyer, VP of Website Development or me. You don't have to be a computer wiz to do this. Give it a try and see how a website can help your region's recruiting effort.
