It Is What It Is

Ron L. Scott



When you first see Ron L. Scott's automobile you may think it is in need of a major restoration. The paint is faded and rusty. The chrome is starting to pit and is not real shiny. The interior is also showing its age. But if you take the time to talk to Ron I'm sure you will see what he has is an "oyster", not too pretty on the outside but it contains a "pearl" once you open it up.

Let's get the details out of the way first. Ron owns a 1951 Pontiac Streamliner Sedan Delivery truck. Production numbers show around only 1300 Sedan Deliveries made by Pontiac that year. A rather rare bird. Originally the truck came with a straight 6 cylinder 240 CI engine that developed 96 horse power. The engine was followed by a manual 3 speed transmission (The engine in the truck now is from a 1950 Pontiac Sedan Delivery, which makes perfect sense when you hear the rest of the story). The only options it came equipped with was a radio and heater.

Now for the good stuff, its history.

Ron's grandfather and two uncles, Glenn and Jack, were in business together. They operated Coleman and Sons Electric Co. They did all types of electrical work. In 1950 they needed a truck to carry their tools and equipment to job sights. So they bought a new '50 Pontiac Sedan Delivery. It was the perfect type of vehicle for their needs. When it came time to service the truck they took it to a Mobil service station in Clayton N.J. The owner of the station liked the vehicle so much he decided to buy one and use it at the station. He wanted a 1950 model but by the time he took delivery the model year had changed and he got a '51. He then had it painted with a white top and a red bottom to match the Mobil gas station.

Sometime around 1958 the Coleman and Sons Electric Co. decided they needed another truck. So they went to the Mobil Service station and bought the red and white '51. The '51 came with bucket seats, that is one seat for the driver and one seat for the passenger. The problem was there were three workers that had to ride in this vehicle. The easy fix was adding a third "bucket" seat, and I do mean bucket. For years one uncle rode to and from work sitting on an overturned bucket. Of course, the Mobil logo had to be painted over and the Coleman Electric signage added. Ron says one of his uncles got busy with a paint brush and paint. For reasons we can't be sure of, Ron's grandfather really

liked the look of the fifty. He wanted both trucks to look the same. Granted there is not a lot of differences between the two years. But, when he had a chance to get a '50 hood ornament and front grill he bought them and put them on the '51.



Several years later in 1974, Ron was building his first house. His grandfather thought it would be a good idea if he had a vehicle to store all his tools in so he didn't have to load and unload them all the time. Since the '50 was no longer being used he gave it to Ron. Only catch was it was not running. But a free vehicle is a free vehicle. Ron took it with the intention of getting it going and using it. However, the best laid plans sometimes go awry and he never was able to use it. It got stored in a barn on Ron's property.

The '51 sat outside at one of his uncle Glenn's home after it stopped being needed as work truck. His uncle's plan was to restore it. The first thing he did was sand all the red and white paint off. If he broke through to bare metal he shot some spray can primer on the spot.

After several years of the truck sitting outside Ron finally convinced his uncle to bring it to his house and put it in the barn. He finally did with the understanding he could come up and work on it when ever he wanted to. And he often did. The problem was he would first stop in the house to get a cup of coffee and would never quite get around to working on the truck. So there it sat, next to the '50, in Ron's barn.

Fast forward to 1995 when Uncle Glenn died and Ron became the proud owner of the '51 Sedan Delivery with all the top coat paint sanded off and surface rust showing through. Now both of the family work trucks were Ron's waiting to be resurrected.

Sometime around 2014 Ron took on the task of getting the '51 on the road. He drove it like it was for a while but after a few years decided to replace the '51 engine with the '50 engine. He had that one rebuilt and put it in the '51. Now, not only the grill and hood ornament was from a '50 but so was the engine. I think Ron's grandfather would approve of the change.

Today, Ron and his wife Annette are not afraid to drive it. With 80,000 miles it gets around fine. They go on tours and to meets regularly. Of course the lack of air conditioning forces them to trailer it when heading to distant regions.

At a car show once in Pitman New Jersey, which is not far from where Ron's family is from, an older gentleman came up to him and said, "I know this car! It belonged to an electrician." When Ron explained that it was his grandfather and uncles who owned the business the fellow said, "I have something that belongs in this car." Of course Ron was puzzled. The man did not live very far from the car show and said he would be back in few minutes.

He soon returned with an electricians tool belt full of tools and the following story. Seems as though Ron's uncle was working at this fellow's house and it was his last day he was going to work. Not just his last day working at that location but his last day to work...forever. His Uncle told the fellow, "Don't call me anymore for any work to be done. This is my last day." With that, he took off his tool belt and hung it up in the man's basement. And there it hung for many years until he brought it back to the Sedan Delivery truck. Ron now displays it in the truck just as it was all those years ago.

Of course, the lack of air conditioning forces them to trailer it when heading to distant regions.

At a car show in Pitman, New Jersey, a spectator recognized Ron's car as belonging to an electrician. Ron explained about the family business. The spectator returned with an electrician's tool belt full of tools. Apparently, Ron's uncle was working at the spectator's house on his last day going to work before retirement. He told the spectator it was his last day, promptly took off his tool belt and hung it in the man's basement. It hung in that basement for many years until it made its way back to the Sedan Delivery truck. Ron now displays the belt in the truck just as it was all those years ago.
