## THE 1919 BUICK—HER NEXT CHAPTER Story and Photos by Charlie Steffy

75 Years. A lifetime. Certainly a long time to own an automobile. But indeed, that is how long my family owned our 1919 Buick. First, a little background on this particular automobile. Picture it...the small town of Elizabethtown PA, right after WW I. A son returns home from the War to End All Wars and his father buys this new Buick to be used to deliver groceries from Keller's Grocery, the family business. This Buick served the family well for thirty years but after World War II the Keller's decided it was time for a newer car. The 1919 was advertised for sale for the astronomical sum of \$200. My father looked at the car and, more importantly, passed the scrutiny of the Keller's and proving that he was worthy of the car.



The 1919 moved into a back stall at our family Buick and Chevrolet dealership in Lititz, pretty much out of the way. That is until the day my grandfather walked through the shop and spotted the 30 year old car just sitting there. "Whose car is this?? What is it here for?" My father stepped forward and explained the car. Not too impressed, my grandfather asked the purchase price. Upon hearing the outrageous sum his son had paid for the car, my grandfather let loose with quite a tirade. Keep in mind, right after the war, large touring cars were bringing \$50. Model Ts were practically worthless. Model As were not much better. Four times market (trade in) value was outrageous!

Undaunted, my father kept the 1919 Buick. Of the many other cars that were traded at Lititz Springs Garage, he only kept the Buick. He was courting my mother at this time. Mom was a high school English teacher in Carlisle PA. They met when she was teaching in Lititz but she transferred the following year to

Carlisle. After a seven year long distance courtship they wed. And the Buick came along as part of the deal. My sister was born two years later and I came along in 1963. Our childhoods were filled with rides in the antique Buick to go for ice cream, check out the Christmas lights in town during the holiday season, watch my father proudly take the WW I veterans in our annual Memorial Day Parade, and going to local car shows. The culmination of each year's activities was the drive up to the AACA Eastern Fall Meet each October. Hershey!

Ever since I was old enough to walk the fields my Dad and I made that drive each October. Some years we were bundled up like arctic explorers. Other years a sweatshirt was all that was necessary. Dad never bothered with the side curtains! Back when the flea market was all dirt (or mud) and the show cars were parked in front of the stadium the folks at HERCO would have a few rides open on a pay-as-you-go basis. As soon as the 1919 Buick was parked in class 16 it was off to catch a few rides on the Comet. I could tell by the look in his eye, when the lap bar came down he was back in those carefree post war days when GIs could relax and have fun again after serving their country. One day stands out as less than fun filled. Dad was a cigar smoker. Each year he had his day's supply in his shirt pocket. Well, for those of you who know the Comet, the first two drops after the initial climb are lift you out of your seat awesome. Lift you out of your seat and also toss every cigar you had for the day right into Spring Creek. Dad was not happy about that. But I digress.

## The 1919 Buick (Continued)

My last ride to Hershey with Dad was October 1992. We had another wonderful day with the old cars but everything changed two months later. The man who introduced me to the antique car hobby died of a massive heart attack just two months later. As was his wish I inherited the Buick. It was quite comforting to fire up the 1919 and go for a drive in the countryside around Lancaster County PA. I could feel his presence beside me and he always made me feel that everything was going to be OK. Each summer there was the list of local community car shows that I still supported. One in particular stands out in my mind. The small village of Landisville PA has a nice car show and fall festival each year. It was the late 1990s or early 2000s. I was living in Florida at the time but the 1919 Buick still lived in my garage in Lititz, PA. I entered the Buick as usual and, after strolling through the classes of cars I sat behind the Buick to rest. An elderly man approached the car, read the owner's card on the windshield, studied the interior and the top more carefully than a casual observer, looked at the windshield card again confused by the Florida address and then looked back at me. Rather timidly he approached me and asked if I was related to Eugene Steffy of Lititz. I said yes, Eugene was my father. He smiled and told me that he was the one who had replaced the top and interior for my Dad in 1958! Quality workmanship because that top and interior is still in the car today!

I continued the annual trip to Hershey each October. When my Mother passed away in 2005 my sister and I decided to keep the family home in Lititz PA. I had moved to Fredericksburg VA and then to Altamonte Springs FL so having a place to come to, and a place to store cars and parts was pretty handy. A four bedroom home also allowed me to host many international car enthusiasts each fall. Ivan and Graham from New Zealand and Dan from Denmark bundled up one year for the coldest ride to Hershey that I can remember. Even the ride home after judging was completed necessitated leather coats, scarves and gloves! In 2019 I decided to throw a party for the 1919 Buick. She had just gotten her Centennial Badge from AACA President Mel Carson. Buick friends from far and wide came to Class 16 at 2 pm for a birthday toast to the guest of honor. It was such a good feeling to see how a car, and the old car hobby, can bring people from all over the world together for a week of camaraderie. The love of old cars is, to me, the best hobby one could ever choose.

Fast forward a few years to 2023. Time marches on and even though the mind is willing the body reminds us every day that we are not 21 anymore. I knew my mobility was decreasing. Climbing in and out of the Buick, double clutching, every aspect of driving the car safely was becoming more difficult. On that sunny day on the last day of Hershey 2023, I was sitting behind the Buick in Class 16 when I heard two young men approaching. For those who walk the show field at Hershey, Class 16 is surrounded by many impressive brass cars on one side and the incredible classics just across the roadway. A simple 1919 Buick is not outstanding by any means. I heard one of the young men tell his friend, "I would love to have a Buick touring car like this." I looked up and saw he was wearing an Elizabethtown College shirt. My niece is an E-town alumni. That was the ice breaker to start the conversation that would change both of our lives.



The two young men introduced themselves as Nick Seiber and Jason Cunningham. Nick is the one who expressed interest in the Buick. The conversation led to "what cars do you have?" A 1916 Studebaker, 1928 Buick, 1940 Buick and a Model A. Hmmm. I have a 1941 Studebaker and two other Buicks. "Where do you live?" Elizabethtown...where the

1919 lived the first 30 years of her life! "Are you serious about wanting a Buick touring?" "Yes" Nick replied. Ok... call it Divine Intervention or pure coincidence but I have found the best possible caretaker for the Buick! We agreed on a price and sealed the deal with a hand shake. One stipulation though. The car will pass ownership at Hershey 2024...she will be 105 years old and the Steffy family will have cared for her for 75 years. And so, a few weeks ago, in Class 16 on the show field, Nick Seiber drove home in his new car.

Nick is 25. He drives and enjoys old cars. His friend Jason has a 1924 Packard touring and a 1925 Cadillac touring. I had the honor of meeting more young car enthusiasts at Hershey this year. They tour, they drive, they repair, they learn to love old cars just like we did. For the nay sayers crying "the antique car hobby is dying!" my reply is Hell No. The AACA has a very active region called the Greenhorn Region. They tour. They enjoy old cars. They build antique cars into their daily lives.

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### Do you speak HPOF?

In 1987 AACA established an exhibition class called HPOF (Historic Preservation of Original Features) to encourage owners to save and display collector vehicles in their original and unrestored, as manufactured condition. Until recently, this class was fairly obscure and usually relegated to the far side of the show field where few spectators got to view the vehicles. Recently there seems to be more interest in these “time capsules”. It has been reported that at 2024 Eastern Meet at Hershey, Over 191 of the nearly 1400 vehicles entered were in the HPOF class. Many of the collector car publications are now featuring unrestored cars in contrast to their usual fare of highly restored vehicles.

Certification as an HPOF a vehicle requires that it must be at least 25 years old, and retain significant features in original unrestored condition. A vehicle may be entirely original or it may have certain original features such as paint, chassis, upholstery, engine compartment, etc., that are essentially as delivered from the factory. These vehicles are not point judged but are certified to have an average of at least 65% of their original features of exterior, interior, chassis and engine. Once a vehicle is certified it is awarded a badge for the front of the vehicle and the owner is presented with an exhibition award and a board to display the initial and subsequent awards. Once a vehicle is certified as HPOF, it can be evaluated at a subsequent National meet in order to receive the AACA “Original” badge. This award requires fewer non-compliant features on the vehicle than the HPOF award.

Why would AACA encourage the preservation of these unrestored vehicles? Since its’ founding, AACA has been dedicated to the *preservation*, restoration and maintenance of vehicles.

In many cases, all of the published manuals, sales brochures and other literature available will not provide the level of detail available by examining an original car as delivered from the factory. How many times have we said to ourselves, “if only I could look at an original car to see how this part looked”? It is not uncommon to have a vehicle that has undergone several restorations over its life and few traces of how it originally looked remain. This is why we need to save the HPOF vehicles.

As an owner, why would you want to keep your car in unrestored condition? I can tell you from my own experience that it is really special to have such a car. First, the expense of maintaining the HPOF vehicle is very low. You drive it, show it, enjoy it and only repair it if it breaks. The parking lot dings, the primer showing through the rubbed out paint and the occasional paint chipped off the air cleaner are just a testimony to the vehicle’s originality. You won’t see HPOF cars roped off from spectators or displaying “Don’t Touch” signs. People seem to relate more to the unrestored vehicles since they are more representative of the cars we grew up with that were far from perfect. If you are lucky enough to find a low-mileage, original vehicle you can spend hours on end at shows telling spectators the story of your HPOF vehicle. Next time you are at a meet, check out the HPOF class and I think you will agree with me, these vehicles are special!
